The Bible captures life's rich tapestry. All kinds of people from all backgrounds meet with God in different ways and at different points on their journeys of life and faith. Every one teaches us about what it means to be human. But far more significantly, God reveals himself and demonstrates His desire for close relationship with us. Here are just a few examples:

- I love the centurion who, 'keeping watch over Jesus', on the cross, filled with awe and terror as an earthquake strikes, announces, "Truly this was the Son of God!" (Matthew 27:54). Only then are his eyes opened, but right at that moment he sees!
- I adore spirit-filled Simeon in the temple in Jerusalem. I picture him lifting the newborn Jesus high as he praises God saying 'You may now dismiss your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen your salvation'. After a lifetime of watchful waiting and longing, this devout old man sees Jesus. (Luke 2:29&30)
- I am fascinated by feisty, deceitful Jacob and his puzzling all-night wrestle with God. Jacob's life was a never-ending struggle with his inner self and outer life. He sees God face to face, and says, 'Yet my life was spared'. Despite his wrongdoing, he receives a blessing from God. (Genesis 32:20)
- And so many others! Daniel and his obedience in a culture not his own; humble Mary who meets with God's angel with trembling displaying a true and simple faith, Ruth who steps outside her comfort zone in a time of great hardship because she wants to follow the God of the Bible; the criminal who recognises Jesus as his Saviour in his last breaths.

It is an endless list of beautiful humanity. Individuals created by God, getting it wrong, getting it right, all precious and all one in Christ Jesus. In our school, tapestry I see each of us as his masterpiece'. Today is my 367th day here and I am so grateful and delighted. What a privilege to work with so many different personalities and individuals, with so much energy and enthusiasm, so much potential and opportunity!



Safe Space

During the summer break, there were a number of issues which arose that might be topics of conversation or shared through influencers and videos on social media platforms like TikTok. In assemblies this week we've been exploring these concerns and how they may impact our thinking or our communication with others.

Chapel

- Lucy Letby: a neonatal nurse who, during the summer, was convicted of the murder of a number of babies while in post. While this case seems to be one of an aberrant individual, we must also recognise that, for some young people, it may erode their trust in healthcare professionals, including the School Nurse service which has given enormous support to our community.
- Andrew Tate: an influencer who expresses some quite extreme views but is idolised by many for his

perceived success. Evidence compiled by Romanian prosecutors against him alleges coercion and sexual assault. While this case remains live, Tate's influence is still strong, and we must be mindful that some young people will look up to him as someone who gets exactly what he wants.

 Two pole vaulters faced huge criticism online following their decision to share the gold medal a the World Athletics Championships, held in Budapest this year. The backlash reinforced sexist views that women's sport is not as competitive or engaging to watch. As a school we are bucking the national trend, winning the School Games Gold Mark Award which recognises high participation in school sports events. But for many girls up and down the country, they will find this yet another barrier to participation in sport which we know is crucial for a physically and mentally healthy life.

We'd encourage discussions about this at home and opportunities to share ideas about how young people can challenge sexist or misogynistic views when they hear them.

Accidental Death of An Anarchist

On Monday 4th of September students went to the Theatre Royal, Haymarket to see a modernised depiction of Dario Fo's play. It portrays the investigation of a railway man who "accidentally" jumped to his demise, in the presence of the police.

Justin Udo has written about his response to the event.



"Plays are significant for many reasons. Some are designed to entertain by making you laugh or keeping you at the edge of your seat, and some are designed to make you think, informing you of the social issues of the time. <u>Accidental Death of an Anarchist</u> succeeds at both.

"To everyone's relief, the play was able to make up for what felt like a 5-hour long journey (despite only being 2 hours!) on a coach full of singing students. The show was wonderfully carried by its lead, Daniel Rigby as the Maniac, who excelled in his physical comedy, with the whole audience laughing. Most memorably, he slithered his way off a table and onto a chair before landing on the floor in the most exaggerated way imaginable: I can't even begin to do his acting justice. You *must* see it for yourself to fully appreciate just how much energy was brought to the scene. Couple that with a slew of modern references, fourth wall breaks, and quick-witted line delivery and you have yourself a near perfect performance.

"Although the production's references to '*Barbenheimer'*, *The Sound of Music* and more for some surprisingly well executed laughs (again, a testament to the performances), they didn't detract from the social commentary on police corruption and its subsequent violence. The play's final moments exposed the ugly truth of a corrupt police force. Although, the ending was a departure from the original source material, it still had impact, given its tailoring to a modern British audience and implication about the fate of the abused and their abusers. Even after the bows were over and the curtains were drawn, the show left us reflecting on the sheer number of unwarranted deaths at the hands of police brutality."

Leadership and Management - Safeguarding

Ofsted categorises safeguarding in schools as 'effective' or 'ineffective': our inspection last year confirmed that we have **effective safeguarding arrangements** at our school. Ofsted Inspection teams reach a decision about safeguarding by exploring the following:

1. Does a school do everything possible to enable students to complete their courses?

- 2. Does a school promote an open and positive culture around safeguarding which:
- helps to protect students from harm (online and offline);
- recognises that 'it can happen here' ('it' being a range of unsafe behaviour);
- is open and transparent, sharing information with partners and actively seeking advice where required.

3. Does a school ensure that its staff is appropriately trained to recognise and respond to safeguarding concerns?

4. Does a school seek the views of the community and respond to concerns raised?

5. Does a school actively identify students who may be at greater risk?

6. Is a school receptive to challenge and reflective of their own practices to ensure safeguarding policies, systems and processes are kept under continuous review?

1. Ofsted checks that schools don't 'off-roll' students – a process where students are taken off the school roll and left without options for their future. We never off roll. We are committed to ensuring that all our students progress to the pathways that are best for them.

2.Our school has a culture of safeguarding. We recognise that 'it can happen here' and we ensure that safeguarding is done *with* our students – not *to* them. We work closely with partners such as social services and the police, sharing information responsibly and appropriately. We consult with experts, both within the county and beyond to seek advice when needed. We also share information with our whole community, through assemblies, tutor time activities and in our 'Safe Space' section of the newsletter.

3. We're committed to safeguarding training. Staff, volunteers and governors all receive regular training and know how to respond to safeguarding concerns as they arise.

We seek out opportunities to hear from our community. This week, for example, we have held interactive safeguarding assemblies (see page 3). Students can talk things through and ask questions about safeguarding concerns that impact them. This year, we've also launched a project with Childnet to develop a group of Digital Leaders who will share online safety advice with the school community and be a source of support for getting the best – and avoiding the worst – online.
 We recognise that students who are already vulnerable are at greater risk. We know our school community well and work closely with families to support our students, identifying those who might need more from us than others.
 We review and update our safeguarding policy and associated processes annually, and we foster a culture of reflection and review. Our quality assurance processes mean we continuously review for best practice and our governors, and external auditors, provide helpful and constructive challenge.



How to View Timetables in Edulink


