Parent and Student Engagement

Research shows that parent engagement with schools is closely linked to better student behaviour, higher academic achievement, and enhanced social skills. The Education Endowment Foundation found that parental engagement has a positive impact on average of 4 months' additional progress by students.

We are delighted by the level of parental engagement at our school, but we are always considering how to tailor our communications to encourage ongoing, positive dialogue about learning.

Recently, we introduced Edulink One. This is a highly respected educational IT solution which brings together key information to ensure staff, parents and students are as up to date as possible on key matters. At a glance, information such as reports, student timetables and homework can all be seen, and absences can be reported very efficiently through this platform. We have already received many, many comments about its positive impact from all users - parents, students and staff. Since its introduction, over 1500 parents have logged on, with just over a half of parents using the app rather than the online version. This is huge "early adoption" compared with other schools, and highlights just how invested and engaged our parents are!

Next week, we will host the second Parent Forum for parents of students in Year 7 and Year 12 to give us feedback on our admissions and induction processes. It is designed to provide a face to face opportunity for parents to share feedback with us and to give comment on new initiatives. For example, our first Parent Forum reviewed our reports, and parent contributions led to even greater refinement which will be seen when reports are issued this year.

Safe Space

Over the last week, we've been exploring some key acronyms with our students. While only a minority of young people may be affected, it's critical that students are aware of local and national concerns.

CCE: Child Criminal Exploitation. This is when a child is used by another person or group for criminal activity, typically through manipulation, coercion, deception or violence.

CSE: Child Sexual Exploitation. This is a form of sexual abuse which occurs when an individual or group coerces, manipulates or deceives a child into sexual activity.

CL: County Lines. This is used to describe the supply and sale of drugs, typically from a major city into towns and rural areas. Children can be targets in this process.

FGM: Female Genital Mutilation. This is a procedure where the female genitals are deliberately cut, injured or changed but where there is no medical reason to do so.

European Day of Languages 2023

Treasure

ALLNE, NfLNE and partners are once again organising an annual European Day of Languages writing competition for Schools, and in 2023 it is once more open to the whole country!

The organising committee invites language learners in any key stage to create a piece of text in a language they are learning on the theme:

Treasure

We think that younger language learners might remember this year's Coronation and focus on a literal image, related vocabulary and description, or imagine a 'treasure chest' of favourite words. Older students might approach the theme by thinking of precious things they (or others) treasure (pets, people. objects, places, property, art, ideas ...)

There will be certificates and prizes!

The text must include words in a language or languages other than English, and could include imagery relating to the concept. Presentation is important, but judges will look principally at the **language** in the text, rather than the quality of any images. No entry can be larger than a sheet of A4 paper.

Pupils should write their name, age, language used, class, teacher and school on the back of their entry.

A Parent Guide to Ofsted Inspections

Personal Development

The current Ofsted inspection framework places a great emphasis on students' personal development and how the school and its curriculum contribute to this.

OFSTED inspection teams focus on ascertaining whether students at a school are receiving a carefully considered Personal Development programme that gives them the knowledge that they need to make informed decisions, strengthens them personally and contributes to building their character.

To reach their judgement they will explore the following questions:

- 1. Does the curriculum extend beyond the academic, providing for pupils' broader development?
- 2. Does the curriculum and wider work of the school support pupils to be confident, resilient and independent? Is there high-quality pastoral support within the school?
- 3. Are students prepared for life in modern Britain, and understand how to be responsible, active citizens that contribute positively to society?
- 4. Is there an effective promotion of equality and diversity within the school?
- 5. Are students prepared for future success in education, employment or training?

Here are some of the ways that we provide students with a holistic education that goes beyond academic achievements and prepares them fully for the myriad of challenges that they will face.

The "Extended" Curriculum

The range of extra-curricular activities on offer fosters both independence and inter dependence and provides opportunities for all students to realise their unique potential. In years 7 - 9, this includes STEM days, residential visits to Govilon and the Scillies, the cross-disciplinary "Bishop Award" and the Debating Club. Students can be part of the largest Duke of Edinburgh centre in the East Midlands or engage in enrichment activities as diverse as sports clubs, the Brilliant Club Scholarship Programme and the annual Holocaust Awareness Day. Sixth Form students can choose to join the EPQ programme or a subject society, apply to become part of the BSS6 student Leadership team or enrol as a Reading Partner to a KS3 student.

Character Development

"Our Intent" clearly articulates the kind of education we seek to provide for its students and this is echoed in assemblies, termly eucharists and lessons. Behaviour at the school is excellent while engagement with music, sporting and other cultural programmes is high. Success is celebrated through the Year 7 Bishop Award, termly Achievement assemblies and the annual Celebration of Achievement evening.

Pastoral Support

The Pastoral Team at the school leads on this drawing on us in this area. Where they also use both conventional routes of support (e.g CAMHS) and para-professional expertise such as Think for the Future mentoring and Souster Youth Emotional Health provision.

British Values

The fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect and tolerance are learnt about by all of our students in PSHE. This subject is at the centre of Personal Development programme and the curriculum is centred around six core themes. These enable us to fulfil our statutory duties but also follow the principles of best practice as outlined by the PSHE Association.

As well as PSHE, events such as the House Games inculcate a sense of belonging and identity while initiatives such as the community-focused Faith in Action days, Core Values in Action awards and the annual Christmas Hamper project ensure our students are civic-minded and ready to contribute to wider society.

A promotion of Equality and Diversity


