Black History Month

Black History Month takes place in October to recognise and celebrate the achievements, art, history and excellence of African and African Caribbean communities. It brings hidden histories to light and helps us to consider biases in making history and to evaluate the importance of multifaceted perspectives.

Our History curriculum has embedded Black history, raising awareness of the contributions that communities and individuals have made over centuries in shaping our dynamic and diverse country. In Year 7, we consider the significance of local Kettering and Northamptonshire individuals. Lilian Bader was one of the first Black women to join the British armed forces and Walter Tull, who joined Northampton Town F.C in 1911, was the second person of African-Caribbean mixed heritage to play in the top division of the football league. Tull went on to serve as the first African-Caribbean mixed heritage man to be commissioned as an infantry officer in the British Army during WW1.

In Year 8, we consider some of the 200 black people living in Tudor England, the most notable being John Blanke - trumpeter for Henry VII and Henry VIII. We also look at the West African kingdom of Benin and the Songhai Empire before the arrival of European slave traders, before exploring the impact of the transatlantic slave trade and the experiences of African people in this shameful aspect of the British Empire. In Year 9, we reinforce this learning through exploration of civil rights as part of a unit on protest. We study civil rights protests in the UK as well as the US, considering prominent activists such as Paul Stephenson, Guy Bailey and Roy Hackett and the Bristol Bus Boycott.

This year, the theme of Black History Month is 'Saluting our Sisters'. It focuses on the role black women play in shaping history, inspiring change and building communities. We are encouraging all students to enter a <u>National Poetry</u> <u>Competition</u> (deadline 15th November) and are asking them to share their entries with us. Please encourage your children to <u>email</u> us a copy of their entries for a chance to win the Bishop Black History Month poetry competition.


