### Safe Space

As you may be aware, three teenagers from Kettering have been charged with attempted murder following a stabbing in Barton Seagrave in the early hours of New Year's Day. In tutor times and assemblies this week, we have provided an opportunity to discuss knives and knife crime. Using resources from the Local Authority, Leicestershire and Northamptonshire Police, students have discussed:

- · why people might carry knives;
- · laws surrounding knives and knife crime;
- · case studies:
- advice on how to report concerns.

Crucially, we have reassured students that the number of young people who carry or use knives is very small. Police estimate that 99% of young people will never carry a knife.

If students are concerned about someone carrying a knife or being involved in criminal activity, they can speak to a trusted adult in school or report via Fearless: Give information about crime 100% anonymously | Fearless | Crimestoppers (crimestoppers-uk.org).

We will continue to hold all those impacted in our thoughts and prayers and would encourage any student to speak to their Form Tutor, Head of Year or our Chaplain if they would value additional support.

They have also taken part in a practice and a qualifying expedition. This is a huge achievement for them and we are all incredibly proud of what they have achieved!






