Safe Space

There has been much in the news recently about the government's view that mobile phones in school can be an unhelpful and unnecessary distraction. At the end of last half term, they released guidance for schools which you can read here: [Mobile phones in schools - GOV.UK \(www.gov.uk\)](#)

Like many schools, we have had a Mobile Device Policy in place for a number of years. While there are enormous benefits to mobile phones and other smart devices, they are a distraction during the school day. Our policy is simple. We have a ‘gate-to-gate’ approach. Students in Years 7 – 11 are expected to turn off their phone at the gate and place it in their bag for the school day and only take it out again once they have left the school gate at the end of the day. For Sixth Formers, there are designated areas where they are allowed to use their phones for study purposes.

If any student has a mobile phone out during the school day, or it is seen in a place that is not designated, it will be confiscated.

Year 10 Ski Trip to St Johann in Austria

Over half term, 62 students were accompanied by 8 staff on the annual ski trip. The journey to St Johann in Austria was always going to be a long one, but we hadn't bargained for road closures in Belgium and a 2 hour wait for a new bus tyre to be fitted, which ramped the total journey time up to 26 hours. Luckily, the ski hire shop stayed open especially for us and after fitting everyone with skis, boots and helmets, it was soon dinner and an evening of unpacking, ready for the 6 days of skiing ahead.

The weather over the week can only be described as typically British – ranging from t-shirt weather, a day of constant rain then followed by days of light drizzle. In fact we didn't see a flake of snow until Friday, when it came down incessantly. The mild conditions meant that the skiing conditions were challenging to say the least, but this didn't stop the enthusiasm and perseverance of what was mainly a group of beginners. As is always our aim, all students progressed from the nursery slopes up the mountain by the end of the week, where they were greeted by blue runs that resembled mogul fields rather than the smooth pistes we would have liked.

If the skiing wasn't enough, evening activities included ten pin bowling, swimming (which everyone enjoyed so much, we went twice!), a visit to Kitzbuhel and an ice hockey match, where the local team were unfortunately soundly beaten 4-1. The week flew by and it wasn't long before we were packing up the coach for the return journey, which thankfully was a mere 19 hours.

The success of a school ski trip is often measured by the injury count! Despite a slight scare on the last day, which thankfully turned out to be a slightly sprained ankle, everyone returned fully intact. Throughout the week, the behaviour and attitudes of the students was exemplary and so I would like to thank them for this. 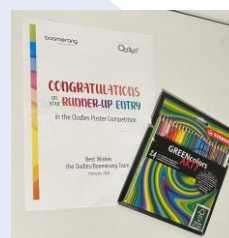
